

PAST PRESENTATIONS

Dear Neighbors,

After three years of service, I have retired as President of the ITHA Board

I have enjoyed serving, but find less time to devote to the job. Consequently, I cannot do as good a job as I should like and as the neighborhood deserves. The President's position now is being ably filled by long-time resident Lonnie Lawson. In this last communique, I look at some challenges facing the Terraces.

I am struck by the realization that many issues have concerned the struggle to balance one's individual rights with community needs. I suppose this dialectic reflects society as a whole, and deeper thinkers than I have examined the diverse questions it raises. As in any debate, problem resolution comes with communication.

The Board recently tested in the Courts the Association's power to enforce the tenth restrictive covenant recorded against all Terrace properties, popularly known as the "Fence Covenant". The Courts found against the Association on the grounds that enough fences and hedges (which the Court regarded as fences) have been erected in years past and that the Association has lost its right to enforce the covenant.

I understand the urge some folks feel to build fences, what with perceptions of increasing threats to personal safety. However, it's that withdrawing tendency that both destroys neighborhood character and encourages crime. While building fences to protect themselves, people also cut themselves off from their neighbors and erode one common denominator amongst neighbors, that of the neighborhood character and aesthetic. The original designers of the

Terraces understood the importance of a consistent look for neighborhood identity. Instead of combating threats with isolation, I should like to suggest better communication.

In communication, we understand problems confronting us and work to solve them. Solutions that may elude us individually may dawn on us as a group. Although S.A.F.E. groups have program tangibles, such as street signs, window stickers, and property ID, it's the opening

of communication channels that lies at the heart of their success.

While the ITHA is not the only forum for communication, it has the sure advantage of existing already; we don't have to start from scratch. As an organization of, for, and by (to coin a phrase) its constituents, it could become a vital force in maintaining the quality of our urban life.

Consider the Association's potential if we make it a vital part of the neighborhood. A strong, active organization can make contributions in addressing future issues and opportunities, such as Ocean Avenue rejuvenation, Terraces landscaping, and recreational and social opportunities. I hope that we all will work with the Board to ensure that the Terraces remain a safe, attractive, and desirable place to live.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to make my contribution.

diplomat, Peter did an outstanding job. He is a perfectionist and very detail oriented (read: architect by profession).



BANK of Ocean-Faxon Branch

West of Twin Peaks Central Council (WTPCC)

The WTPCC is working with the OMI to try to keep the Bank of America from closing its Ocean-Faxon Branch. Anita Theoharis and Paul Conroy testified at Supervisor Medina's March 6 hearing on the issue and the following letter was sent to the Mayor and the Supervisors:

Dear Mayor Brown:

The West of Twin Peaks Central Council has been working in partnership with the OMI Community Action Organization in an effort to improve the Ocean Avenue retail area between the 280 freeway and 19th Avenue.

We have met with representatives of the San Francisco Planning Department and the Mayor's Office of Community Development to attempt to put together a comprehensive plan which will have all City departments working together to improve the area.

As we expressed to you during the April 1996 Economic Summit, we are concerned about the vacancy rate of retail establishments on Ocean Avenue, the lack of a grocery store to serve the neighborhood, the blighted and unsightly appearance of portions of this business strip, and the dilapidated condition of the street pavement and Municipal Railway tracks and facilities.

Now we are faced with another blow to this vital area of the City. As you know, the Bank of America has announced plans to close its branch on Ocean Avenue and Faxon. The closure of this branch will deprive the community of essential branch banking services. In addition, and perhaps more significantly, the departure of this major presence on Ocean Avenue will send a signal to current and prospective commercial establishments that Ocean Avenue is not a viable retail location, leading to the further decline of this retail strip.

The West of Twin Peaks Central Council has passed the following resolution asking for your help and the help of the Board of Supervisors in keeping the Bank of America on Ocean Avenue:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS the West of Twin Peaks Central Council has as one of its goals the improvement of Ocean Avenue between the 280 Freeway and Nineteenth Avenue;

WHEREAS furtherance of this goal is achieved by retaining businesses on Ocean Avenue that serve the local community;

WHEREAS for many years the Bank of America has, through its branch located at Ocean Avenue and Faxon, provided banking services to the local community, including several member organizations of the West of Twin Peaks Central Council;

WHEREAS the presence of the Bank of America Ocean Avenue Branch has enhanced the Ocean Avenue business strip from both a business and architectural perspective;

BE IT RESOLVED that the West of Twin Peaks Central Council strongly urges the Bank of America to maintain its service to the community by continuing to operate at its Ocean Avenue - Faxon branch;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the West of Twin Peaks Central Council asks that the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco join with the Council in working to keep the Bank of America Ocean Avenue - Faxon branch open.

We urge you to do what you can to keep the Bank of America from turning its back on the West of Twin Peaks and OMI Community. We ask that you join us in working for the economic, social, and aesthetic improvement of this business district which is so vital to this part of the City.

When the Moon hits your eye ... Pizza!!!

Everyone has a favorite pizza joint. Some prefer the price of **Round Table** others prefer the variety of **Mozzarella di Bufala**, 69 West Portal. There is a large contingent who crave the garlicky **North Beach Pizza**, 4787 Mission. In my mini-research project I learned there is a wide berth when it comes to taste in pizza.


In an effort to learn more about pizza for the Terraces, we ordered! We tried **Paradise Pizza** in West Portal and it was okay. To this day I wonder if they cooked the sausage *on* that pizza. We called **North Beach Pizza** ... always a long (45 minute) wait and well worth it. I have never been disappointed. Well, one time the pizza arrived cold and late and I told the manager and he was more than courteous and generous with a rebate.

We have had success with Mozzarella di Bufala. That place is amazing. The pizza chefs always look like they are having such a good time. They are good, sometimes great, and sometimes inconsisitent. Another pal prefers Mr. Pizza Man because of the price. (She could buy Mr. Pizza Man.) However, Frida's Pizza on Mission at 24th, 920-0899, is perfectly fabulous ... a wee bit pricey but really great pizza. Their rock shrimp/cilantro, three cheese is heavenly.

But, last week we were downtown and we hit **Tommasos**, 1042 Kearny, 398-9696, and had their *pepperoni sausage pizza*. The **BEST**, hands down. This is real pizza. You can watch it being cooked in the brick oven and the crust is outstanding. Tommaso's wins! It's the best pizza anywhere; *Waiters on Wheels* will deliver their pizza ... **Mangia!**
